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A Message From The President

Ciao a tutti! Hello to all of you!

School has finished and everyone is enjoying lots of family time. Some of you are even getting a chance to travel. As your summer is filling up with activities, please keep in mind the events the Italian-American Cultural Center of Iowa has to offer.



When anyone mentions the word "Tuscany" one immediately imagines tall cypress trees, panoramic landscapes among rolling hills, the city of Florence, and Michelangelo's sculptural masterpiece, David. However, Tuscany is so much more. It has seven localities which have been designated World Heritage sites: the historic center of Florence (Tuscany's regional capital), the Cathedral Square of Pisa, the historical center of San Gimignano, the historical center of Siena, the historical center of Pienza, the Val d'Orcia, and the Medici Villas and Gardens.

Tuscany also produces wines including Chianti, Vino Nobile di Montepulciano, Morellino di Scansano, and Brunello di Montalcino.



Tuscany, and especially Florence, is regarded as the birthplace of the Renaissance. But, before the Renaissance, Tuscany was inhabited by the Appennini and Villanovan cultures, the Etruscans, and the Romans. Pilgrims traveling between Rome and France brought wealth and development to Tuscany during the Medieval period. The ruling Medici family benefitted enormously from Florence's growing wealth and power. With the annexation of Arezzo, the purchase of Pisa, and the addition of Livorno, the Medici family created a republic in 1434 with Florence as its capital.

Looking Back at the Dress and Food of Soveria Mannelli By Jari Chiodo Sinnwell

I was very fortunate to receive a copy of an out of print book, "Soveria Mannelli e il suo Territorio" by Mario Felice Marasco. Marasco, born in Soveria Mannelli in 1904, has written a variety of history books. This book, written in Italian in 1969, is an uncommonly comprehensive picture of all things Soveria. I was especially fortunate to receive an English copy of this book translated by Des Moines' own Sara Chiodo Woolford.

Here is an excerpt from that book in Marasco's own words:

"A. G. Strutt, in 1842, wrote: 'In Soveria the costumes are delightful. One young girl was waiting at the fountain to refill her barrel. Her head wear was formed by one solid white cloth: a tight coat of black velvet, whose sleeves came to the elbows, was covered with a vest of pale blue, low cut and laced in the back allowing a glimpse of the scarlet underskirt. Completing the outfit was a delightful green apron."



"Life now goes on orderly and with uniformity and few are the particular customs in Soveria. Even in Soveria, as in the rest of Calabria, the basic food is the pasta and for the young people it was a time of merit to know how to prepare the pasta at home in its various ways: fusilli, fischietti,

cavatelli, ricci di donna, strangugghj, delicate even when seasoned with thick stew, slices of tomatoes, a bit of oil or mixed with cucumbers, legumes, or stuffed eggplant or flavored with sharp cheese or tender ricotta, or sprinkled with grains of black pepper or covered with hot peppers."

"The pizza is not widespread and with the pitta, which has the same entomology (from picta dipinta) is a kind of doughnut. The pizza with the red of the tomatoes, the green of the basil, the rose of the anchovy, and the white of mozzarella, and the slices of pepper within the browned circle, is imported."

"Among the varieties of bread, other than the pitta. Is the 'fresa,' the crisp bread adequately seasoned with oil and tomato and eggplant."

"Meat is not much in demand, accessible are the leg of lamb, goat, meat from pigs and the entrails."

"Also dried cod is traditional and the sardine and the sardoni. The popular vegetables, hot peppers, peppers, eggplants, zucchini, tomatoes, fave, peas, onions, potatoes, ceci, also with pasta are vivid in my memories, the minestra of pasta and fave, pasta and peas, pasta and ceci, potatoes and peppers, pasta and broccoli with pig rind."

"Spices and condiments are abundant - pepper, oregano, finocchio, celery, parsley. Among the milk products, the ricotta, mozzarella, butter, head cheese, caciocavalli."

"Among the wines, the Ciro, the wine of S. Biase, the Greek dik, etc."

Their food preferences and recipes followed them to America. I'm sure many of us remember wonderful meals cooked by our nonnas.

The Italian-American Cultural Center has published a cookbook of such recipes. It is titled, Cucina Italiana. What a wonderful collectton of heirloom recipes!

Siena was incorporated into Tuscany in 1555, and Lucca remained independent until 1847, when it became part of the Grand Duchy of Tuscany. The Medici family ruled Tuscany until 1737, when the last family member died and Tuscany was transferred to the Duke of Lorraine, who was the husband of the Austrian Empress Maria Theresa. After the second

Italian War of Independence, Tuscany became part of the Kingdom of Italy.

Tuscany has an immense cultural and artistic heritage as can be seen in the region's churches, palaces, art galleries, museums, villages, and piazzas. Florence is one of the world's most important water color centers and is often nicknamed "art palace of Italy". Dante Alighieri, author of the Divine Comedy, was from Florence. Also, many musicians and composers, including Giacomo Puccini, are from Tuscany.

I also must mention the simple, yet rich, cuisine Tuscany has to offer. This year's gala dinner will feature the Tuscan cuisine. The gala dinner, a fundraiser benefitting the Italian-American Cultural Center of lowa, will be held on November 8th, 2018, at the Embassy Club in downtown Des Moines. 



Italian Naming Traditions

There has been a custom in Italy that determines how children are named:

- The first male is named after his paternal grandfather.
- The second male is named after his maternal grandfather.
- The first female is named after her maternal grandmother.
- The following children could be named after a favorite aunt or uncle, the parents, or a deceased relative.

You will probably see examples of this in your family and, although this custom is very popular, don't assume it to be the rule in finding your ancestor's name. If you know your grandfather, Giuseppe, was the oldest son, don't assume that his paternal grandfather was named Giuseppe. There are exceptions to this custom that need to be mentioned

A man has a firstborn son and names him Antonio after his paternal grandfather, then he has several other sons. At age 7 Antonio dies so, if the man has another son, he would name that son Antonio after his paternal grandfather again. Another exception might be that your ancestor didn't know who his grandparents were to name his children after. There were many orphans and illegitimate children born in 19th and early 20th century Italy. If your ancestor was estranged from his family, they might not follow the naming tradition, or they just might not be traditional and follow the custom! It sure does make for difficult genealogical research at times.

Because of the pervasiveness of the custom, you will find many people sharing the same name. For an example: Cataldo Leo marries a woman named Rosa and they have three sons - Domenico, Pietro, and Donato. Each of these sons marries and has his own children. As per the custom, they will all name their first son Cataldo after their father, and they will all name their first daughter Rosa after their mother. We have three Cataldo Leo's all born in the same town, within the same generation, possibly even born in the same year. The same situation exists for Rosa Leo. So now you come along looking for the birth record for your ancestor Cataldo Leo, and you must be diligent to get the right ancestor. It might be a birth date that tells you, or a notation on the birth record of who they married that is the clue to solve the dilemma.


We Are The Chosen

100 Best Things To Do In Italy

Second in a series of the best places to visit in Italy.




5. Sistine chapel

Situated in the Vatican City, "la Cappella Sistina" is most-famed for its frescoes, in particular its famous ceiling and "The Last Judgement" painted by Michelangelo in the years between 1508 and 1512. Masterpieces by Botticelli, Raphael and others adorn the walls, and the floors are wonderfully intricate inlaid marble mosaics (known as "pietra dura").



6. Climb Mt. Vesuvius (Naples)

Around 9 kilometres east of Naples towers the famous A Mount Vesuvius (1,281 m high), which erupted in 79 AD burying the towns of Pompeii and Herculaneum. Vesuvius is the only volcano on the European mainland to have erupted within the last century: the last eruption was in 1944. The area surrounding the volcano was designated a national park in 1995, however the summit is available to visitors. Road access stops at 200 metres from the summit, after which access is on foot only.



7. Leaning tower of Pisa

Famous worldwide for its lopsided appearance (caused by a foundation of only 3 metres in unstable subsoil), the leaning tower of Pisa was built in three stages, commencing in 1173 and continuing for a further 199 years, with some structural strengthening carried out between 1990-2001. Actually the bell tower of the cathedral, the leaning tower of Pisa contains 7 bells, one for each note of the scale. It is 55.86 metres high and one of Italy's largest tourist attractions, drawing over 1 million visitors annually.



8. Solfatara

The Solfatara in Pozzuoli, near Naples, is a series of shallow craters created by a now dormant volcano which still emit sulfurous fumes and jets of steam. The healing properties of its vapors were well recognized by the Romans 4000 years ago; quite apart from that, it is a fascinating and scary glimpse into the internal workings of our planet.



9. Cinque Terre

"Cinque Terre" – quite literally "five places" – is the name given to five villages on the Ligurian coast of northwest Italy – Vernazza, Corniglia, Monterosso al Mare, Riomaggiore and Manarola. Owing to their picturesque aspect between cliffs and sea and the fact that they can be easily accessed by rail or boat, but only under extreme difficulty by road, they are immensely popular with tourists. This explains in part why they were designated an UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1997.

A Dream Becomes Reality By Patricia Civitate

In 1981 a dream began. It was a dream of establishing a facility that would showcase the enrichment of the Italian heritage and culture, which was an important part of the lives of the Italian-American community. It would also tell of the Italian contributions to the New World.

For 15 years, the Board of Governors of the Cultural Center was homeless. Meetings were held regularly in the downtown library, St. Anthony's basement, Denny's restaurant, and in the homes of organizers. As thoughts of a permanent location became an important matter, a search committee was formed. Several locations throughout the city and surrounding metropolitan area were explored.

Then, one day, an unexpected call was received informing the board that the family of Carmine "Sam" Marasco was selling their property. It was located at 1961 Indianola Avenue. The board had 10 days to make a decision. Marasco was the founder, in 1917, of the Sonny Boy Bread Co. This company evolved into the Supreme Bakery in 1925. Since the bakery had employed many Italian immigrants, it seemed a sign that the board should proceed. The purchase was made possible by a \$50,000 State of lowa Historical Grant.

The building, which was divided into 3 equal parts, had 2 large rooms and a garage. In the beginning, the south section of the building was one massive empty room. The area had four bare walls and a worn green tile floor with a few cracks. Above, was a 14' ceiling. At one point, it had been an indoor driving range. With several volunteer carpenters and electricians, working alongside a dedicated Board of Governors, the museum was born. Walls were built and painted, partitions were built that divided the museum into a series of open-air display areas. A large showcase was donated in memory of Vincent J. Scavo by his family. Another showcase was received from John and Tonette Soda Stevens. It was donated when they closed their trophy shop in Creston, lowa. A discarded small display case was also received from St. Anthony parish.

Several individuals began to donate pictures, artifacts and household items from their ancestors. Slowly but surely, the museum was beginning to take on a life of its own. The time had come for the board to decide how it would get community involvement and participation, donors and visitors.

The Cultural Center has now become a destination for those who visit Des Moines and the state of Iowa.

Our mission is to promote, preserve and provide education about all aspects of the rich Italian-American culture to the Des Moines metropolitan area and the State of Iowa.
