ST. JOSEPH ALTAR

The Mission of The Italian-American Cultural Center of Iowa is to preserve the "culture and traditions of our Italian ancestors". One of those traditions is the observance of the beautiful feast of St. Joseph. The Feast of Saint Joseph is celebrated on March 19th

Our celebration of the St. Joseph Altar began in 1997. The first altar was 18 feet long - and 3 steps high, representing the Holy Trinity as dictated by the instructions. It was necessary to cancel our celebrations in 2020/2021, but in 2022, we were able to renew our observance in our newly acquired Cultural Center location. Our event has grown and, last year, the altar was 120 feet long and 3 steps high.

This year, because of the unavailability of our facility due to imminent renovation, we are making plans to celebrate our event in a different manner.

COMMUNITY DONATION

IACC of lowa is encouraging would-be attendees and all others to bring non-perishable food items or cash donations to the north parking lot of the Cultural Center on Saturday, March 11th, from 10 am – 2 pm. Volunteers will be in the parking lot to collect donations for the food pantry, and all proceeds from cash donations will go to Catholic Worker House and St. Joseph Shelter. In addition, IAAC volunteers will prepare the traditional vegetable frittata to donate to Catholic Worker House and St. Joseph Shelter.

FAMILY OBSERVANCE

We would also like to suggest that family members gather together to prepare and share a meal. Because the feast of St. Joseph takes place during lent, one traditional dish is the vegetable frittata.

Curiosities

The Gothic Cathedral (Duomo) of Milan houses a cycle of 55 monumental stained glass windows, created between the end of the fourteenth century through the 1880's, a patient and centuries-old work that involved several generations of artists from half of Europe. I have always found it very difficult to read these figurative cycles and their deciphering even more complicated. Already at the beginning of the fifteenth century, just twenty years after the foundation of the Cathedral, the large windows of the apse began to be assembled and the first ones were towards Santa Radegonda, therefore those that can be observed coming from Corso Vittorio Emanuele.

But, unfortunately, only very few fragments remain of these first stained glass windows, as they were remade on several occasions in the following centuries.





The technique used in these first windows involved the assembly of colored glass on which the design was reported with the grisaille technique, a very complicated process which involved spreading an amalgam of glass powder from the inside of the window, which was later worked with scratches and removals.

The most serpent-tongued historians recounted that, towards the early afternoon, the Flemish masters specialized in grisaille were lying drunk on the ground, given that the liquid used to amalgamate the glass powder was wine, and it was known that the vineyards owned by the Veneranda Fabbrica produced great red wines.

The local masters, on the other hand, were more diligent in their duty and resented the Flemish artists. One local artist was Antonio da Pandino, who dedicated 36 years of his life to the stained glass windows of the Cathedral without ever a day of rest. Which makes Alexei Grigoryevich Stakhanov, the Russian labor hero, look like an amateur in comparison.

After the 19th century, the glass was instead made with the method of fire painting, a technique much more similar to traditional painting, with which the colors were fixed on originally neutral glass. This technique gave rise to much more modest results, especially from a luminous point of view, which is why I always recommend visiting the windows of the apse to appreciate the original essence of the mystical light of the Cathedral.




The most extraordinary of the stained glass windows is undoubtedly the one depicting the Raza, just behind the altar, a Visconti emblem formed by ten wavy snakes forming a sun. Observing it both from inside and outside and at various times of the day is always worth it.
